PRESIDENT'S **M**ESSAGE

It's getting to look a lot like open water. In Devils Lake, where I live, it may be a while yet but I got my boat out and put it in the garage to start my spring ritual of cleaning, rearranging, rewiring and daydreaming. I'm looking forward



to fishing on the river when I come to Mandan for the NDSFC Annual Meeting, April 12th.

The Mission of the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress is to work with and support the North Dakota Game and Fish Department in protecting and improving our excellent fishing resource. With the upcoming Legislative Session, it is particularly important that we support the Sportfishing Congress. Decisions will be made in Bismarck next winter and spring that will affect the fishermen of North Dakota for years.

In recent years, two issues have become critically important. One is the constant political threat of other North Dakota Agencies and Politicians raiding the Game & Fish reserve fund dollars for their special interest projects. Of particular concern is the use of those dollars for the Department of Parks and Recreation construction projects which charge a fee for public usage and also the use of those dollars to support private development on Lake Sakakawea. NDSFC has consistently resisted those efforts and will continue to do so. We are not against improving parks or against development of super-marinas, but not with Game and Fish, user generated, dollars. In fact we have consistently supported these activities but not with G&F money. The other major concern is the threat of Aquatic Nuisance Species to North Dakota waters. We have an ever increasing number of fishermen, waterfowl hunters and boaters coming to enjoy our lakes and rivers from other states as well as our boaters going to other waters and then returning. Every time a boat goes from one body of water to another, there is the potential for irreversible introduction of a foreign species which could severely damage that fishery. We need to educated and police ourselves and others constantly to prevent cross contamination of our waters. Game & Fish has lots of information on how to prevent this and there are now state regulations and penalties for those who violate those regulations. WE HAVE SEEN THE ENEMY AND IT IS US. So keep your boats, trailers and livewells clean.

North Dakota Sportfishing Congress supports a full-time lobbyist in Bismarck during the Legislative Session. In the past, we have shared this position with Friends of Lake Sakakawea, but conflicts in our separate missions have led to some strong disagreements and this year we will be supporting our lobbyist without Friends. Because of that, we need your support even more than usual. Be sure to renew your membership, get your friends to join and if you can make it, come to the Fundraiser on April 12th at the Mandan Eagles, have a good time and support the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress.

SPRING NEWSLETTER – Look for the Spring Newsletter to be out May 1st. Reports from Game & Fish, Corps of Engineers, Fish Hatcheries, Parks and Recreation as well as club information, Annual Meeting info and a statewide "calender of events" will be included. Share with your friends. Get them to support the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress. This is particularly important in a legislative year.

GAME AND FISH PERSPECTIVES

Another fishing season is upon us and unlike last year, there are a number of new regulations that all need to be aware of and follow. Seldom (if ever) in the past was there a short time period when fishing proclamation changes and



new administrative rules came into being at the same time – that will be the case when the new fishing season begins April 1st. Biological need and public input were instrumental in developing and guiding these new regulations ... and interest and concerns by Sportfishing Congress membership were helpful in this process. Drafts of some of these changes (ANS) were shared in previous newsletters. Although there was a slight overall increase in the number of proclamation changes compared to the last period, many of these changes were intended to simply clarify areas of past confusion.

It is important to get this new information out to all those who fish thus the following is a brief summary and explanation of the new regulations.

New or Modified Administrative Rules

- Any container used to hold bait must be free of aquatic vegetation when transporting.
- ♦ All watercraft, trailers, motors and other recreational and construction equipment must be free of <u>aquatic</u> <u>vegetation</u> when leaving a water body. This includes all built-in structures.
- ♦ All <u>water</u> must be drained from watercraft (including motors and bilges), recreational, commercial, and construction equipment when leaving a water body (exception water in live wells for bait and/or game fish can still be used for transport).
- Operators and haulers of all watercraft and recreational, commercial or construction equipment must inspect their equipment for aquatic nuisance species when removed from waters of the state or upon entering the state. If present, the aquatic nuisance species must be physically removed immediately.
- It is illegal to import fathead minnows or stickleback into the state.

Proclamation

- Spottail shiners will no longer be considered a legal live bait fish.
- Establishes a wanton waste restriction. No person shall possess any game fish species then waste, destroy or abandon the edible flesh (fillets).
- Clarifies there is no storage limit at one's personal permanent residence for fish fillets; however, at no time may a person transport more than a possession limit.
- Clarifies that gifting fish is legal. However, gifted fish including packages of fish must be accompanied with the following information from the individual gifting the fish: name, fishing license number, phone number, date and species and number of fish gifted.

- The packaging of fish away from one's permanent residence must be done in such a manner that the number of fish in each package may be easily determined.
- ♦ Added two weeks to the backside of the dark house spear fishing season (will now run through March 15).
- Opened 16 new lakes to dark house spear fishing.
- ♦ Removed the maximum size (12" diameter) of a hole while ice fishing. However, when a hole greater than 10 inches in diameter is left in the ice after ice fishing or when a dark house is moved, the hole must be adequately marked with a natural object or colored or painted wooden lathe which must be visible from a minimum of 150 feet.
- Clarifies that it is illegal to introduce any substance in waters of the state for the purpose of attracting fish that is not attached or applied to a lure. Decoys used for dark house spear fishing are excluded.
- In years when the paddlefish harvest cap (1000 fish) is projected to be met before the end of the season (May 31st), changed the 60 hour public notice to close paddlefish season to 36 hours.
- Eliminated the 14" minimum walleye size limit on Lake Elsie, Brewer Lake, and Dead Colt Creek Dam; struck all size restrictions for Sprague Lake and Lake Tewaukon.
- ◆ It shall be illegal to leave fish houses on state-owned or managed land after March 15 of each fishing year (changed from April 1).

In all cases, public input is sought when regulation changes are proposed and such was the case this past year. Favorable comments were received on many of these changes. North Dakota's fishing regulations are fairly straightforward and hopefully simple to follow. By keeping our regulations simple, all anglers can relax and enjoy themselves while participating in fishing.

Spring is very near and as always some of the best fishing of the year awaits. Lake Sakakawea continues to suffer from both the chronic lack of water and depressed forage; nonetheless, there continues to be a fair walleye population and with (relatively) good access, fishing should be good. The Missouri River should again provide ample opportunity to hook a walleye of all sizes and the overall population is in very good shape. Likewise, Devils Lake will offer great fishing not only for walleye, but also for the very abundant northern pike, as well as white bass and some yellow perch. Beyond the big three, North Dakota continues to offer more than 280 other water bodies to fish, many of them supporting good fish populations – some that come quickly to mind include Jamestown Reservoir, Lake Ashtabula, Lake Audubon, Heart Butte, Stump Lake, the Red River plus numerous others, many near your back yard.

Don't procrastinate this spring ... get out and wet a line!!!

<u>Lure 'Em' For Life</u> is a statewide volunteer organization of North Dakota Game & Fish Volunteers established to provide fishing education to people of all ages.

We have conducted a week long fish camp on the north shores of Lake Sakakawea near Garrison for the past 17 or 18 years. In 2004, we started volunteering for the Devils Lake Parks & Rec Department to do a week long camp for kids ages 8 to 14 years of age. This year will be our fifth camp on Devils Lake.

Each camp costs our organization around \$5,000.00 and the only reimbursement that we receive is the gas for the boats for the Devils Lake camp. Other monies come through grants from the Game & Fish Department, business donations, memorials, tournament proceeds, membership dues and discounts on supplies or donated bait.

Specific details as to the educational services that we provide at week-long camps, evening and weekend seminars are available. Groups that we have provided evening and weekend services are Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Head Start, 4-H Clubs, Youth Conservation Corps, children whose parent or parents of National Guard and Reservists who had been deployed to Iraq or Afghanistan, Women And Fathers. The women classes are taught by women volunteers, The fathers Are taught fishing techniques so they may educate their own children.

Our officers and Board members are from Bismarck, Fargo, Center, Minot, Valley City and Jamestown. Members are from Marion, Dickinson, Mandan, Mort, Parshall, Devils Lake, Williston and Garrison. There are two members from Minnesota and one from Boise, ID.

Formed in 1986, the North Dakota Sportfishing Congress (NDSFC) gives the North Dakota sportfishermen a unified voice that can respond to a wide range of issues concerning the fishing resource and recreational fishing. The NDSFC is the umbrella organization for all the fishing clubs of North Dakota as well as individual member fishermen. Its primary purpose is to be the liaison between North Dakota's recreational anglers, and the North Dakota Game & Fish Department. The organizations NDSFC works most closely with include:

- State of North Dakota Administration and Legislature
- North Dakota Game and Fish Department
- United States Congressional Delegates
- US Army Corps of Engineers
- North Dakota Parks and Recreation
- State Water Commission
- US Fish and Wildlife
- US Federal Hatcheries
- North Dakota Department of Health
- North Dakota Tourism Department
- ND Legislature's Aquatic Nuisance Species Committee The NDSFC has a <u>full-time Lobbyist</u> during the Biannual Legislative Session. The NDSFC efforts concentrate

on sportfishing issues that have statewide significance. In recent years, NDSFC has focused on certain specific areas

and provided timely information to its members on:

- Supporting the Game & Fish Department in their mission
- Protecting Game & Fish funding from outside special interests
- Promoting fishing access throughout the state
- Promoting the prevention of Aquatic Nuisance Species introduction
- Development of the Lake Sakakawea Corps of Engineers Master Plan

The NDSFC works with the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, member clubs, and individual members to enhance the fishing and fishing opportunities in the state. The NDSFC is a ready conduit for timely distribution of important sportfishing information to members and clubs.

The activities supported by NDSFC membership and by your membership include:

- ✓ Correspondence with individual members and member clubs;
- ✓ Providing a website on which each member clubs has their own webpage;
- ✓ Email and phone tree that allows quick dissemination of information to member organizations and feedback to NDSFC and the North Dakota Game & Fish Department;
